Give Us this Day Our Daily Bread

Up to now, in our look at the Lord's Prayer, we have seen the need for

prayer, that it is a connection with a power that is greater than ourselves. In its

most basic definition, prayer is being willing to tell God what is on our hearts; it is

having a conversation with God. Even though we believe that God already knows

what is on our hearts and for what we need to pray, it is good that we are able to

vocalize those thoughts and concerns which we have.

Thus far, we have recognized that this prayer is a community prayer, not

just with each other, but also with Jesus when He told us to pray "Our Father." In

this introduction to this short, concise prayer, we acknowledge both the

transcendence of God being in heaven and the intimacy of God by calling God our

'daddy.' In the petitions about God's kingdom coming to earth and God's will being

done here on earth, we noted a tension built into this prayer. This tension

acknowledges what God has done for us already, but also recognizes that humanity

has not always done the right thing. In this we yearn for God to help make things

better and right, according to God's will and plan.

If we look at the organization of the petitions of the Lord's Prayer, we see

that they reflect the organization of the 10 Commandments. If you'll recall, the

first 3 commandments have to do with our relationship with God, acknowledging

that God is the source of all that we have. The last 7 commandments address how

we relate to one another. While the commandments and the Lord's Prayer petitions

may not exactly line up, we do see that these first petitions acknowledge God as

the source of all life and all that we have. After it is acknowledging this fact, does

Jesus turn the prayer to our needs.

Let us now to turn to the first specific petition in this prayer, "Give us this

day our daily bread." In brief, this petition is asking for our security. Martin

Luther included everything which we need to live as part of our daily bread. In the

Small Catechism, Luther writes that daily bread includes "food and clothing, home

and property, work and income, a devoted family, an orderly community, good

government, favorable weather, peace and health, a good name, and true friends

and neighbors." In short, it all those things that provide for our security in our

everyday lives.

Security is something which humanity has been trying to achieve since the

beginning of time. Over time, the concept of security has often changed from the

basic survival of staying alive against forces that try to kill humans to having the

security of staying safe in one's home and having the basic needs for life. We look

for assurances that these basic needs will not only be met for us, but also

guaranteed that we will have them when we need them. Not only do we look for

security for ourselves, but we look to have a secure future for our children and

grandchildren. A part of this security is to give them a better future than what

we had. This security may include making sure that we leave an inheritance to our

children; give them the things which we did not have growing up; making sure that

they have a good education. It may also be making sure that our neighborhoods

and schools provide safe environments for our children to learn and grow.

There is nothing wrong in looking for security. However, most times, we look

to others to provide that security. Whether it is through local, state or national

governments, the school boards, or even to businesses, we look to human sources

for security. Unfortunately, sometimes, those entities may have a different focus

on security than what our focus is. They tend to look out for their own security

and how they define it regardless of what others see as security. Many times,

those different understandings of security are in conflict with each other and

usually those without the 'power' are the ones to lose out.

What this petition asks is that we turn to God for that security. Again, we

need to notice that this is a communal prayer - give us this day our daily bread. It

is not a selfish prayer, as though we ask for what we need at the expense of

someone else. Rather, we ask as a community of God's children that everyone

receives what they need. The other thing we need to remember is that the One to

whom we are praying is still the same One whom we addressed at the beginning of

this prayer - God. We may overlook the fact that we are still petitioning God and

we then have a tendency to look to 'easier' sources for this security.

Perhaps it is our lifestyle that clouds this thought that it is God who does

the providing. Living more and more of an urban lifestyle for more and more

people, we tend to forget that for those basic needs that provide for that 'bread'

we still depend upon God for the right weather at the right time, good soil and the

other things that make for a good harvest that allows us to eat, build homes and

everything else that actually depends on agriculture.

Here in America, we have gotten away from depending on God and have

developed a strong sense of self-determination. We think that if we work hard

and rely on as few people as possible, we can make all our dreams come true. But

just like relying on God giving us gifts to have a good harvest, we should be

recognizing that God is the source of all our being to be able to do what we do. For

example, if one has the ability to do heavy manual labor to earn their living, isn't it

still God who made the person and gave the person the gift of strength to do that

kind of work? And isn't it God who gives the scientist the knowledge and skill to

come up with inventions that make life better? In short, any one person cannot do

more than what God has given them the gifts to do. One may argue that one could

lift weights to become stronger or study harder to gain that knowledge, but it still

comes down to the fact that God gifted the person to have the determination to

better themselves. So, as we saw in the earlier petitions, we acknowledge that it is

God who is the source of everything as we are asking God to grant us those things

which provide for the security we desire.

Again, we need to keep in mind that this petition is in the plural. No one is

left out from receiving what is needed for daily life. God has provided enough of

everything for everyone to be secure. It is through the selfishness of some people

who feel that they can control access to what God has given us. We need to have

the trust in God that, like when Jesus fed the people with just the 5 loaves and 2

fish, that everyone will be filled and that there will be some left over.

May we continue to turn to God for all that we need, thanking God for all

that we are and asking the Holy Spirit for guidance to become all that we can be.
